BACKGROUND INFORMATION TO CHW TRAININGS

Except for the Indian Health Service (https://www.ihs.gov/chr/chrtraining/) that provides training to CHRs, there is no widely accepted national standardized core training or curriculum for CHWs. Thus, as each state develops its own CHW training, it is important for each state to consult nationally accepted definition of CHWs and their agreed upon core roles, examples from other states, and CHWs within their states. The following resources can provide guidance:



APHA CHW Section's definition of a CHW: A community health worker is a frontline public health worker who is a trusted member of and/or has an unusually close understanding of the community served. This trusting relationship enables the worker to serve as a liaison/link/intermediary between health/social services and the community to facilitate access to services and improve the quality and cultural competence of service delivery. A community health worker also builds individual and community capacity by increasing health knowledge and self-sufficiency through a range of activities such as outreach, community education, informal counseling, social support and advocacy. https://uat.apha.org/apha-communities/member-sections/community-health-workers
